

## CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE D

#### STOP UTILITY USERS' TAX

Residents of Sierra Madre currently pay a Utility Users Tax (UUT) for water, gas and electricity service. The current rate is 10%, which was approved by 71.5% of Sierra Madre voters in April 2016. The UUT is a general tax, where revenues are paid into the City's General Fund. General Fund revenues are budgeted by the City Council annually for general City services, such as police and fire protection, 9-1-1 emergency response, paramedics, parks, libraries, and street maintenance and repairs. If approved by a majority of Sierra Madre voters, Measure "D" would amend the City's Municipal Code by repealing the UUT on gas, electric and water service in its entirety. This measure is on the ballot because a number of residents circulated a petition and obtained sufficient signatures to qualify for the ballot under California Elections law. Therefore, the City Council placed this measure on the ballot. If the measure is approved, the General Fund will no longer receive UUT revenues resulting in a loss of approximately \$2.6 million per year, representing a loss of 24% of the City's annual General Fund budget. The UUT is the City's second largest source of General Fund revenue after property taxes.

If the UUT is repealed, there would be a significant impact on the City's ability to provide services and programs at current levels. The City Council will have to decide, as part of the budgeting process, whether alternative revenues can be found, or whether City services and programs will have to be reduced or eliminated. Options to offset this potential revenue loss were considered in the Elections Code Section 9212 report approved by the City Council on February 9, 2016 which included: contracting out police services; eliminating locally controlled paramedic program; reducing Planning counter services to 2 hours per day, four days a week; reducing sidewalk and street repair and maintenance, eliminating most City special events, City programs and Senior programs; and reduce library program and hours by 50%. Measure "D" requires simple majority approval of the voters to pass.

A "Yes" vote on Measure "D" will repeal the Utility Users Tax, and eliminate the General Fund revenue source.

A "No" vote on Measure "D" will not repeal the Utility Users Tax and will maintain the existing tax and the General Fund revenue source it provides.

## ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D

#### "Stop the Utility Users Tax"

Sierra Madre faces a grave fiscal crisis that many residents are not aware of. Neither the City Council nor the staff has adequately reported Sierra Madre's dire fiscal situation caused by growing debt, chronic overspending and increasing taxes.

Although Sierra Madre's population has not changed in 10 years, the General Fund from 2006 – 2016 grew an astonishing 55% from \$6.1 million to \$9.4 million while total city revenues grew 25% from \$17.5 million to \$21.4 million.

The City claims to have tried to reduce employee compensation, yet in 2016, 36% of full time employees earned over \$100,000 in pay and benefits. (Source www. transparentcalifornia.com).

The Big Story is our burgeoning pension debt. Sierra Madre residents are on the hook for paying city employees up to 90% of their salaries for the rest of their lives. Sierra Madre's pension debt is officially over \$10 million. But the real number, according to Stanford Institute for Economic Research, could be as much as \$40 million, 185% of the city's total annual budget. (Source: www.pensiontracker. org) Government elites enjoy pay, pensions and job security the average taxpayer can only dream about. This city, like other cities in California, is on the brink of insolvency.

We do not need the 10% utility tax voted in in 2016. The City needs to get spending under control. The City must move employees to 401(k) retirement plans and pay off the pension debt.

Give taxpayers the relief they need and VOTE YES to Stop the Utility Users Tax.

## REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE D

#### VOTE NO on Measure D.

It is a misleading and misguided stunt. Its authors are self-serving and do not have the best interests of Sierra Madre in mind. Eliminating the Utility Tax will serve only to decimate the services that Sierra Madreans value.

Sierra Madre has been extremely frugal. The salaries for its employees are the LOWEST in the San Gabriel Valley. Sierra Madreans are not burdened by additional property or sales taxes as are our neighboring cities. Sierra Madre has taken radical steps to reduce expenses over the years by cutting staff, giving up control of our municipal pool, and subcontracting recreation services.

In December 2015, City Staff provided a report to the City Council on what it would take to buy out of our pension obligation (CalPERS). The price tag: A \$60M upfront payment to relieve ourselves of future obligations. This is impossible!

Pension funding is a serious problem for EVERY California municipality. It can't be solved by eliminating the \$2.6M generated by the Utility Tax.

Repealing the tax altogether is simply absurd for a community such as ours that places a high premium on its low crime, outstanding community events, library, and services that are the envy of neighboring cities.

Sierra Madre, the "Village of the Foothills" is the jewel of the San Gabriel Valley - a town in which its citizens take tremendous pride. Please do your part to preserve our village- VOTE NO on Measure D.

#### ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE D

- REDUCTION of our Police Force by more than 60% and elimination of 6 officers, risking our public safety;
- **ELIMINATION** of community events and services, such as the Mt. Wilson Trail Race, 4th of July Parade, Wistaria Festival, Concerts & Movies in the Park, and senior activities;
- **REDUCTION** of library services with only 1-2 days of service; and
- REDUCTION in general fund dollars dedicated to fixing potholes, sidewalks, streets, and other infrastructure.

Who supports this misguided and poorly written initiative on our ballot? An out-of-town political extremist group that failed to pass this same measure on the ballot in several cities is now targeting Sierra Madre. These outsiders do not care about our City's needs or how Measure D will hurt our neighborhoods, quality of life, and property values.

## REBUTTAL TO ARGUMENT AGAINST MEASURE D

Don't be fooled! According to the California Tax Limitation Committee (CATLC.net), the City claims it will lose 24% (\$2.6 million) of the General Fund if they lose the utility tax revenue. They fail to mention that over the last ten years, General Fund revenues grew a shocking 55% (from \$6.1 million to \$9.4 million.) General Fund spending grew an equally shocking 46% over the same period from \$5.5 million to \$8 million. Considering the 2016 salaries and benefits earned by highest-paid city employees (TransparentCalifornia.com), it's obvious they spent the "surplus" on themselves.

## CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE A

The Sierra Madre City Council voted unanimously to place Measure "A" on the April 2018 ballot as an advisory measure. Measure "A" is a companion ballot measure to the separate "Stop Utility Users' Tax, Measure "D," and seeks voter input regarding the elimination and reduction of general fund services, if a majority of voters eliminate the \$2.6 million General Fund revenue annual stream provided by the City's existing Utility Users Tax.

The City's General Fund is used to provide public safety services, including fire suppression and paramedic services, police services, library services, road and sidewalk maintenance and other public works and facilities maintenance and repair, administrative services, such as finance, planning and building, and City management. Public safety services, including police protection, fire suppression and paramedic services, comprise the largest General Fund expense, the cost of which exceeds the annual revenue produced by the Utility Users' Tax. Without the revenue stream provided by the City's Utility Users' Tax, the City will be required to find or create new revenues or reduce or eliminate services. This is explained in the February 9, 2016 Elections Code Section 9212 report which analyzed the impacts of eliminating the City's Utility Users' Tax. State law allows the City Council to place advisory measures on the ballot. An advisory measure such as Measure "A" is not binding on the City Council, but expresses voters' views which the City Council may wish to follow if voters approve the Measure.

Measure "A" asks the Sierra Madre voters, that IF they vote to repeal the City's Utility Users' Tax, would they also advise the City Council to eliminate and reduce public safety and other General Fund services to balance the budget. Elimination of services is one approach to balancing the General Fund budget, as opposed to attempting to raise new revenues to replace the loss of the Utility Users' Tax in order to maintain the current level of services.

If a simple majority of voters vote "Yes," then the advisory measure is approved.

A "No" vote means that the voter advises the City Council not to cut General Fund services.


